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

- o Proposed 2021 Budget is \$1,158,707
- o 2.9% increase in proposed giving over 2020 Actuals
- o Benevolence as a percent of giving is at 12% of operating giving (or \$139,045). This is lower than the 2019 percentage of 14.2%.
- o Salaries and Benefits are at \$555,546 and \$183,966 respectively, which includes a 2.0% pay increase for staff and increased health benefits costs.

Approval of the Constitutional Ammendment #1:

The congregation may hold meetings by remote communication, including electronically and by telephone conference as long as there is an opportunity for simultaneous aural communication. To the extent permitted by state law, notice of all meetings may be provided electronically.

Approval of the Constitutional Ammendment #2:

- ~If meeting is being held by remote/electronic communication, this change allows for the use of paper ballots by members who cannot connect or vote virtually.
- ~It also standardizes the constitution and by-laws so that the Congregation Council may, as it deems necessary, enter into contracts equivalent to up to 10% of total budgeted operating receipts for that year.
- ~It also reduces the time under which proposals for consideration by a Congregation Meeting must be submitted in advance, from 60 days down to 31 days.

Results of Congregational Voting Meeting

Thanks to all who participated in our Congregational Voting Meeting held June 5-7, 2021. Because of you, we easily made our quorum! We needed 202 confirmed adults to attend and ended up with 220 people who voted. The election results are as follows.

When Zechariah did come out, he could not speak to them, and they realized that he had seen a vision in the sanctuary. He kept motioning to them and remained unable to speak.

~Luke 1:22

We are in Luke's gospel this year in our Sunday lectionary of readings. Luke's first chapter includes the annunciation to Mary, the visit of Mary to Elizabeth and the somewhat comical story of Zechariah! Told that he and Elizabeth would finally have a child in their old age, Zechariah seemed to doubt or question God's angel. That wasn't a good idea!

He was subsequently left unable to speak for nine months and when he appears to the crowd after his fateful encounter with the angel, I can't help but picture another story I associate with Christmas. Zechariah connects in my mind to the Bumble in *Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer!* The Bumble, having had his teeth removed by Hermey the dentist, is also left unable to make his usual over-the-top noises! Silenced, Zechariah will regain his speech when he vindicates Elizabeth's name choice for the baby John...just as the Bumble finds a new place and voice when he puts the star on the tree as the Rudolph tale draws to an end.

The main lesson of the Zechariah story is that God works through us, often inspite of ourselves. The secondary lesson is that sometimes we see and experience things...sometimes good...sometimes horrible...things we have no way of articulating to others. But wow, do others see it in us. They see us waving around like Zechariah...our expressions of distracted or unshared joy...or our insecurities, shame and scars of traumas. Others see and know something is going on but have no way to fully grasp it, share in it, or help us with it.

This leads me to the work we do as a church. In a congregation with many households no one sees all the joys. No one has a catalogue of all the traumas. We come together in various ways and our better selves want to be there for each other. But in a busy and superficial world, lots works against us. It's as if we see someone else motioning to us, but we cannot hear the depth of what is being said and we miss chances to let others into our lives or to enter into theirs.

I thought a good use of this report for 2021 would be to let you see a few things I witnessed this year. Others of you saw things like this too, but few of you saw certain things happen over and over again the way I could by virtue of being one of your pastors.

I share them because I think the summary of 2021 for us and for our world was that all things being even, it was a lose-lose sort of year. COVID was just hard and though I think most people were on mostly the same page, it was unsettling to everyone and there was a downside to most any decision made by any large group of people.

But me saying it was a lose-lose sort of year is sort of like stopping Luke chapter one at verse 22. Zachariah's speechlessness is not the end of the story. In fact, I think for Luke, it is his storyteller's way of building to the eruption of noise that comes in chapter two. The heavenly host ends up serenading the shepherds and the shepherds rush to tell everyone the Good News! Luke wants us to know that humanity's traumas and pains can and are redeemable. This then leads me to make sure you know the following about your fellow travelers in Christ:

2021 Weddings. We were a part of lots of weddings in 2021. Some were in the church buildings, some were at venues. Some were held over from 2020, some fresh for 2021. What they had in common was unusually high levels of energy for the couple. There's usually applause at weddings, either early in the service with the greetings we do or late in the service as the couple leaves, but the applause this year was different...more

spontaneous, more thunderous, just more! People knew that: planning *anything*, much less your wedding, had been hard; people have been looking for chances to celebrate *something*; and people were just longing to help launch those couples forward. In the midst of everything hard, time after time, these celebrations were filled with amazing goodness. *I hope you can imagine how good those cheers felt to those couples!*

2021 Vaccine Holy Moments. At last count 23 UNITY members had volunteered (some more than a dozen times) to be part of the vaccination effort at the Bread of Healing Free Clinic. Medical volunteers drew up the doses and administered them. Non-medical people helped with greeting and completing the requisite paperwork.

Many of these vaccines were given in the sanctuary at Cross Lutheran. For many people it was the first time back in *their* sanctuary and a chance to receive a vaccine that was potentially life-saving for themselves and for their community. It was one holy moment after another.

Still other volunteers took vaccines to the homes of those who could not leave their homes due to disability or other special need. Time and again, these were holy moments of connection between people who would have otherwise never met...much less in someone's home.

As a congregation we have not always been stellar in our physical presence with our Milwaukee partners, but with lives literally on the line, UNITY members devoted hundreds and hundreds of volunteer hours (not to mention the MANY UNITY members who are medical professionals doing it as their job) to being in the communities Bread of Healing serves. Add this to all the UNITY people who did things like serve meals at Serenity Inn, donate blood, serve in Appalachia or El Salvador and you have LOTS of people risking or giving something of themselves for those beyond our walls. *I am awed by your love!*

2021 Church Council. Everything is hard right now and trying to help lead a church as a volunteer on the church council is definitely harder than usual. COVID made some things harder but a major project like the Backyard and staffing transitions brought on by departures of every sort made it harder too.

I was struck by the goodwill Council members extended to each other. They disagreed sometimes but instinctively listened before speaking. Beyond those meetings they led by example, traveling with our summer groups, making donations of every sort to see the Backyard to completion, teaching week after week of Sunday School, jumping in to music and worship roles whether we were on video, out in the rain, or at a Christmas Eve service. For a church to be alive you need Christ. For Christ's life to shine, you need people who have a passion for his mission. *Ours is a Council passionate for Christ's mission*.

The child in me with the middle name of Rudolph still delights in simple children's stories like a Bumble who is needed in Christmas-town after all.

For the adult me, who sees people as they are every day...in both our hurt and smallness....as well as our very best moments.... a part of me learns, each day to appreciate why Luke starts his gospel where he does. Zechariah's vulnerability is mine too. Yours too. But when Elizabeth speaks for him, he finds a way to add to her voice. And one chapter later, when the shepherds rush to the stable and then tell everyone they know, you see in them then, exactly what you and I are capable of now. Ours is not a dying planet, time or church. We have Good News to tell and the most universal truth we hold is this: should I find myself tongue-tied I know you will speak it for me. ~John

It's the one place in life where I don't have to get it right. It's a gift. Pure and simple. It's what Jesus did for me, for you, for all of us, so that nothing can ever separate us from God's love for us. Not our actions, or inactions and not the forces beyond us, nothing.

In addition to the meal, I'm grateful for so many other things we were able to celebrate this year, the signs of life in so many different forms...baptisms and weddings, faith milestones like kids receiving Bibles and coming to the Table for the very first time through First Communion and kids affirming their faith and (hopefully) feeling our love and affirmation for them through Confirmation! Each and every moment that lifted up, where love was experienced or grace extended is a wonderful sign of Life.

Share

We exist for more than just ourselves. Again, despite the pandemic, we were able to share generously with our partners. You can read the highlights of how and the ways it made a difference for each of them. In addition to all the dollars, there are countless hours of time spent that go along plus all the things that have no dollar amount that can be assigned but the impact is just as great.

Teens and adults spending the week in rural Appalachia (finally) to help families have homes that are safer, drier and warmer and realizing how much they can do even when they haven't been trained in construction. Seeing the value in listening to the stories of the people who live there and receiving the gifts they have to share to with us in return.

On top of all of that, there are the countless ways that I see you share of your time, your experience and your compassion with other members of the UNITY family and beyond our walls. I've experienced it countless times myself and am grateful for it.

In my mind, these are priceless intangibles of a faith community too. They allow for everyone to learn from and also help teach.

2021 allowed more opportunities for this kind of connection, but I'd love to see more in 2022, but maybe we'll have to be a little more creative with the how.

Renew

This is maybe the most difficult to interpret and to live into part of our mission. But even Jesus, in the midst of all the work he did, knew he had to take time away. He had to withdraw from it all to pray and spend time with God. I have to imagine that sometimes it was with a good meal with friends and family, laughing, catching up, and enjoying life.

While people often struggle when Jesus tells the disciples to in defense of the woman who pours this expensive oil upon Jesus' feet "you always have the poor with you, but you not always have me", it seems as if Jesus is telling us something similar in regards to our work.

What is also true is that we're not much good to those around us when our spirits are dried up and when our energy is depleted.

I fear that while so many of us and areas of our society that ramped up ready for a few weeks or a couple months, back in March of 2020, to deal with the reality of the pandemic, can't possibly keep up living in a crisis mode almost two years later. We can already see the effects of that stress and burn out in critical areas of society like heath care, education, and service areas like mental health counseling/support and grief, just to name a few.

When we start to forget the meaning behind why we do what we do, whether out of exhaustion or despair, we easily can start thinking that it must be because there is something wrong with us.

As people of faith, we can't lose sight of who we are, not created to be the Energizer bunny who can keep going and going, but people who need to pause often enough to remember that we are loved by God, created with unique gifts and talents to share, that when doing so, helps to renew the world around us, so we can in turn be renewed by staying in close connection to God, who gives us so much for which we can celebrate! To do this, means we have to stay connected to our mission. To celebrate, share and renew. For all the ways we were able to live this in 2021 and for each of you, I give great thanks!

As we turn our attention now to 2022, may God continue to lead us as we seek to live out this mission as who we are....United in Christ!

Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it on my side. Do not doubt but believe." - John 20: 26-27

My 8th year at UNITY and my 33rd year around the sun! That's the Jesus Year, you know, 33... the age tradition holds Jesus was at his death and resurrection.

Well! Certainly a year full of death and resurrection around here!

Both finances and programs were in a similar position by the end of 2021: financially, overall giving to UNITY is up, while giving to the operating budget

is down. People-wise, overall engagement with UNITY ministries is up, while physical presence at most core programs is down.

Here are a couple thoughts on where we're at as we wrap up 2021 and look ahead to 2022. Per tradition they are grouped by our family's nightly reflection questions:

- 1) something we are grateful for
- 2) something we are troubled by
- 3) something we are praying for

It still seems like the right combination, whatever we are reflecting on. The "grateful for" helps us savor the good stuff; the "troubled by" helps us be honest about the hard stuff; the "praying for" invites God into all of it.

So here's this year's version: grateful fors, troubled bys, and praying fors for 2021:

Grateful for:

Our Physical Buildings and Grounds: Even as we continued all our virtual ministries, most of our programs also returned in some adapted in-person format. Working without them for most of the previous year gave us new appreciation for all these structures make possible for us and for so many community groups.

CTK Sunday School Growth: thanks to an influx of new families and the steady presence of long-time members who carried the torch through some lean years, the Sunday School program at the CTK campus again has a solid and very spirited Christian Ed crew. These kids and their families add awesome energy for learning and service and are just generally a delightful bunch!

Next Generation Leadership Initiative: This was year two for me of a six-year continuing education for new clergy through my home denomination, the United Church of Christ. The material (adaptive leadership this year) and my 14-person cohort both inspired new learning, new energy, and new appreciation for the work we do at UNITY.

Troubled by:

Diminished Elbow Rubbing: The best thing about this work is the chance it gives us to do life with you. That doesn't only happen in person- we love phone calls, zoom calls, and texts! But we miss the interactions that happened organically from sharing the same physical space.

Staff and Volunteer Shortage: We are starting to show the strain of doing more with less. Definitely feeling a bit Matthew 9:35-ish! This same strain is being felt all across all sectors of our economy... how do we as people of faith model a faithful response? Not just pushing harder, and not just throwing in the towel, but a third way? The way of the Spirit?

Operating Budget Decline: The proposed 2022 budget will mark a third year of decreased benevolence totals. The last two years we were able to maintain the same level of giving to partners by supplementing with funds from previous year surpluses and PPP funds. This coming year, for the first time since I started here, we will have to cut partner support. That hurts.

Praying For:

The Backyard Project: may it finish strong, be well used, and bring healing to many!

Our huge new member classes: may they own this place and make it part of them.

Our online community: may they feel truly a part of the UNITY whole.

Our church council and leadership teams: have been so rock solid. May they continue to be sustained by God's spirit and be blessed even as they bless us.

You... yes, you! So many of us are tired, overwhelmed, ill, lonely, or grieving. May we find grace and strength to carry on in our faith and in each other.

That Bible verse is what the just-crucified and now newly-resurrected Jesus says to "Doubting" Thomas when Jesus reappears to him and all the disciples. To me this verse captures both the power of physical presence AND the original call to keep up the work even when apart. Both are true faith. Pursuing both in faith will be UNITY's task for 2022.

Where is their story at this point? Their expectations have been shattered and Jesus is about to leave them, but what they thought was the end was just the beginning. So are they trending up? Down? Growing? Declining? Hard to say...

Our faith teaches us this: death and resurrection turn out to be flip sides of the same coin. As Jesus goes up, the Holy Spirit comes down. All directions are holy when we pursue them with trust in each other's good intentions, and in God's good future.

We have accomplished so much in the past five years in spite of the pandemic. We've tried new ways of worship and welcomed many new people to our fellowship, both in person and on-line. We continue to support all of our partner ministries in Milwaukee and El Salvador. The new outdoor skating rink is just the latest addition to our beautiful backyard Health & Wellness Center that is nearing completion and will be a blessing to

2021 In Review - People, Places, and Things to Know

People working here

We welcomed **Graeme Gallagher** on January 1 and bid farewell on December 31. Graeme shot and edited videos, helped with podcasts and music audio, contributed to social networking, and travelled with us to El Salvador as our half-time Media and Communications specialist. He has now moved on to a full-time position at Rockford College in a location that will work better for Graeme and his significant other.

Though she worked through January 2022, **Melanie Rooney** did draw down her time here late in 2021. She served as our Volunteer Coordinator, Bookkeeper, and Administrative anchor at the Cross of Life campus. Melanie was the face and voice lots of people first encountered at the COL campus and we are so thankful for the welcome she represents. Given that she has historical involvements in our education, servant ministry, youth, VBS, and music programs, it seems likely Melanie will still find something to do here as a member.

Lori Meleski left her role as custodian at the CTK campus but continues there, watching over our kids in the Sunday morning nursery.

Cindy Flynn served as our interim Christian Education Director through August. She connected with families, helped us re-start in-person Sunday School and VBS and maintained strong on-line resources for families to use. We are so fortunate that someone with Cindy's training and connection to UNITY was willing to serve in this interim position .

Michelle Aprahamian assumed the role of ongoing Christian Education Director in September. We are blessed to have Michelle join our ministry team after a career in education that most recently had her in the role of Assistant Principal at Brookfield Elementary School. Michelle's many resources as an educator coupled with her faith and involvement as a mom and member at the COL campus make her such a good fit for UNITY.

John Vaughan joined us during January, assuming the role of Bookkeeper. Earlier in the year, **Kevin Anderson** joined us as Property Manager for both campuses. John and Kevin are both retired and will work in part-time, flexible hours positions that allow them to serve us well while also giving them the freedom to come and go that retirement affords. Kevin's knowledge of our property (as a former chair of our Property Team) and John's background in finance will serve us well.

Brittany Hastings came through our youth programs and has now returned to work as a part-time custodian. For now she is primarily working at the CTK campus, but as her time permits, she'll also begin to learn the ropes at the COL campus.

People Worshipping Here and Beyond

We typically report on worship attendance numbers in this spot. Of course, in-person events have been slightly altered in the past two years by COVID.

During 2021, we were not worshipping inside and in-person for January and February. We did manage to maintain our **outside/parking lot services at the CTK campus** except for three consecutive weeks in winter where we either were battling snowstorms or below zero temperatures. For any and all who were and still are a part of the parking lot worshipping community, cheers all around for persistence! The number of cars in the lot for these services could vary from over 50 to as few as 5. The number of people in the vehicles varied from 1 to 7.

2021 In Review - People, Places, and Things to Know

Once we resumed **indoor services** we added them one at a time at each campus. In fall we began a new UNITY schedule. At the CTK campus we dropped down to a single service but that service is now at the time that's most popular in churches, 9:30 am. The COL campus worships at 5:00 Saturday and 8:15 and 10:45 on Sunday. The **on-line campus weekly worship** becomes available each week on Saturday to be viewed at any time. We are tracking attendance at services and finding it is highly variable...typical seasonal factors apply (high in December, low in summer) but COVID also has a huge impact. On any given week we may be running at 25-60% of pre-COVID in-person attendance. Christmas Eve for example came in at about 60% of the 2019 numbers.

Other major on-line offerings during 2021 were **Thursday Evening Prayer** services live on Facebook through the end of May. These attracted an audience that varied from 5 to 30 views on any given night. This was a half hour mini-service with live music, prayer and scripture reflection.

Over the summer we began a new offering, **Hump Day Hallelujah's**; a few minutes reflecting on a single theme. The link is emailed to all members on Wednesdays and posts to Facebook. The views for HDH currently are 80-100 during the week of release and then trend upward over time.

We also offered **Bible studies** live and recorded on our website and Facebook. These gain an audience over time. A typical number of views for any session that has been on our web-site for awhile is around 20-50.

Our podcast series called **Belief Beat** is currently in hiatus as we work to fill our Media position, but it has had a very successful run, with the number of listens on SoundCloud generally in the 150 range for episodes posted for two or more months and some have approached 300 listens just on the SoundCloud platform. Belief Beat is available on Apple Podcasts and Soundcloud. We hope to resume them shortly.

Our weekly worship services are available as a full-length video, a **sermon-only video** or a **sermon-only audio podcast**. To give you a little sense of how these are listened to over time, last week's (third weekend in February) total view/listenership is currently at 106. Most churches multiply that by 1.7 (assuming one view includes 1.7 people) to come up with a total watch/listen number of 180. Those numbers typically rise over time. If you go back three months, to the November 13-14, 2021 weekend, the numbers are 156/265. Most of the growth over time is in audio listens to the Podcast version.

We will work in 2022 to make our membership roster more accurate. We're aware that lots of people who grew up here, are now in their 20's-30's and have moved away. One of the cool things in 2021 was that some of those people came back too! And anyone who's ever been on our roster will always be considered as connected here when it comes to pastoral care. Still for our "official" membership, we are hurt a bit each year by a quorum number (10% of confirmed members) that ends up being higher than it needs to be. Just looking at the numbers, without taking any actions at this point, a fairly accurate representation of our confirmed (adult) membership is around 1,856, so our **quorum number for this year's meeting can be 186** (down from 202 last year).

UNITY's Education Committee's focus is a balance between educating our children (Pre-K through Confirmation) and building a solid and inclusive community for them to flourish and grow. Community, connections and learning about our faith is the core of all that we do.

2021 was a year of trying to hold on to our traditions while exploring possibilities in the current COVID world. We did our best to carry forward Jo Ann Tomm's legacy, while continuing to flex and grow with the times... just like she would have done.

We applied many of our learnings from 2020 to our core programs in 2021 – balancing virtual events with live programming was a key focus. We also held on

to some of the condensed learnings for Bible Basics, First Communion and VBS.

Cindy Flynn was an amazing blessing to UNITY and our Christian Education program. She led us from January through August with her deep experience in education, her positive and flexible approach and her love of our children and our congregation.

With Cindy's leadership, we were able to roll-out small text groups for families, using Flat Jesus to keep us connected and have fun. We also took the reading/sharing of the weekly Sunday School story to a new level with videos of kids/families sharing their acting skills with each other. — If we couldn't be together inperson, we at least got to see each other via video.

The cereal drive for the Waukesha Food Pantry was another highlight of the year – if you haven't seen the videos, this one is a great recap - https://vimeo.com/showcase/7655099/video/557775352. We had 375 boxes that were donated and a ton of fun building a few impressive domino drops. The focus on community and servanthood continues to be an important piece of our programs. This fall we had a massive birthday cake drive and the CTK kids are on a mission to create friendship bracelets to share with the rest of the congregation.

This fall, we welcomed Michelle Aprahamian to the staff. We are so lucky to have her leading our Christian Education programs. Michelle's experience, leadership and approach to all of our programs has been amazing. In addition to jumping in headfirst to Sunday School, Bible Basics and Confirmation, Michelle led us through her first AdventFest and Christmas Program. The key words this year were 'flexibility' and 'positivity' – Michelle is a pro at both!

Looking ahead to 2022, we will continue to be flexible and positive. Our biggest challenge is recruiting volunteers to help with our programs. If you have any interest in being part of our team or helping with any of our programs, please let us know. All are welcome!

FINANCE Adrienne Krueger, Treasurer & Phil Roemaat, Finance Chair



The Finance Team works closely with the UNITY Church Council to plan, monitor, and account for the financial affairs of the church. We work on the budget, oversee accounting and depositing of the offerings each week, conduct an audit of prior years' record keeping, and advise the Council on other financial matters as needed.

The Finance Team holds regular meetings with team members monitoring all areas including legal, banking, real estate, insurance, and audit. The current members of the



team are Penny Berglund, Kevin Grabowski, Greg Schreiber, and our pastors. We thank them for their support and continuing to help UNITY with their own unique talents, knowledge, and experience. We're a fun engaging group who really care about placing the church in the best possible position for both the church's short-term and long-term goals. If any member of the congregation has an interest in joining UNITY's Finance Team, please contact us; we would love to have you.

For 2021, UNITY went into the year with budgeted giving of \$1,159,000 and projected to have the same in terms expenses; effectively this was a budget with no annual net surplus or deficit. Total giving was \$1,071,000 and expenses and \$1,092,000, which resulted in a deficit of \$21,000. Giving was down almost \$88,000 from budget, but expenses were effectively managed. The disconcerting trend is that giving has been down over the past four years and in 2021 this was accelerated.

Additionally, UNITY applied for and was awarded a Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan of \$117,000 in May of 2020; this loan was forgiven in April 2021. The funds were added to several reserve accounts (general \$83,000 & property \$15,000), provided a small staff bonus (\$5,000), and additional benevolence (\$13,000). Given the additional reserves, the church's balance sheet remains very strong.

For 2022, UNITY budgeted for a 5% increase in giving compared to 2021. This was based on a strong appeal campaign and the hope that our giving trend goes up. Most expenses were similar to 2021; the largest change was in staff salaries & benefits. Additionally, there was a decrease in benevolence. With all these changes, we are expecting expenses to exceed giving, so we are proposing a deficit budget.

In 2021, the mortgage at for the COL Campus was refinanced. The new mortgage is for 72 months with a fixed rate of 3.66%. This has lowered our monthly payment to \$5,241.08, which started in November. The principal at the time of the refinance was \$337,815.17. At the end of 2021 the remaining principal balance was \$329,702.08.

We give special thanks to Melanie Rooney and Craig Nelson for all that they do to keep our accounts in order and reconciled. We are excited to begin working with John Vaughan who has taken on the role of being the church's bookkeeper. Tracking the finances of a church with an annual budget more than \$1,000,000 is a ton of record keeping. Last, we would like to thank all of YOU as a congregation for all your generous giving and commitments to all that we do.

SERVANT MINISTRIES Jackie Herington

In another year of unprecedented times, I'm honored to share that UNITY remained compassionate and generous as always, extending healing and support to our local communities and beyond this year. Thank you for every act of generosity! Thank you to our devoted ministry advocates! THANK YOU and let's keep spreading love and healing during these trying times and may God continue to bless us and our partners.

UNITY has 10 Servant Ministry partners, which include 2 inner City Milwaukee congregations, 2 El Salvadorian congregations, 2 addiction treatment centers, a homeless shelter, a free clinic, a food pantry, and a blood center!! Each partner has a dedicated UNITY advocate that works with the partner to create meaningful relationships with our congregation and walk together as the body of Christ to meet the needs of the people that the partner serves.



In 2021, **over \$260,000** was invested in our partners through benevolence giving. Here are some highlights of the needs that were met for our ministry partners through UNITY's generosity and support:

Aspen Recovery Center received an amazing gift of \$20k from UNITY's Backyard Fund to support addiction treatment!!

Blood Centers of SE WI hosted a total of 3 blood drives and collected 113 blood products with UNITY, enough units to save 339 local patient lives!

Bread of Healing Clinic thanks UNITY for many months of volunteering at vaccine clinics and participation in mobile delivery teams. To date, they have completed 4,500 vaccines for almost 2,000 people! Patients from 76 different zip codes are coming to Bread of Healing!!

Cross Lutheran Church UNITY members took time to volunteer with their Backyard Garden Project, collect and deliver bags for their Food Pantry, and participate in dinner gatherings for discussions to expand our awareness and strengthen relationships with people who have different experiences, perspectives, and needs.

El Salvador - The 24 hour live stream fundraiser was incredible, over \$32K was raised to support over 70 student scholarships funded by UNITY members in 2021!!!

- UNITY contributed \$10k for the El Salvadoran led Mission of Healing Clinic (travel restrictions prevented our usual participation this year). The clinic helped provide in-person visits to each community, providing information and aid around COVID 19 and other usual health issues.
- 15+1/2 travelers visited Rutillio and Cordero connecting with our El Salvadoran partners sharing faith and friendship, celebrating Pastor Norma's posthumous diploma presentation, lots of fun with soccer, food, and dancing, and Worship!!

Hebron House - UNITY Benevolence gifts were used to help fund remodel projects which will enable them to serve more guests in greatly improved spaces! The Lent Offering total was \$17,025 for their technology project, providing wireless internet at all 3 shelters for a full year, along with two new computers and wireless printers for guests in each building. Volunteers stepped up to help with cold weather emergency shelter through March.

Christ the King Parking Lot Re-surfacing Recommendation

The current CTK parking lot was most recently resurfaced when the building was expanded in 1988. We have gotten 34 years out of the surface! The normal life-expectancy is 20-25 years. We are thankful for members of that time for the investment they made in a quality surface.

Knowing the parking lot would need resurfacing at some point, we priced it into the capital appeal for the Backyard project. The appeal reached about 2/3 of its hoped for target.

Knowing that heavy equipment would likely damage the lot further, the Council recommended and the congregation approved the Backyard project go forward minus the lot, with the awareness that the lot would still need to be addressed.

The heavy equipment did do substantial damage to the lot, primarily on the far east end where the subsoil had been eroded by several decades of drainage off the lot.

During fall 2021, Property Manager Kevin Anderson contacted 6 of the largest and best known asphalt companies in the area. Each met with him at least once and some on several occasions and each submitted bids. Along with Property Chair TJ Roche, Kevin worked to get the bids as apples-to-apples as possible in terms of the bid assumptions (eventually all bids were for a 2 1/2 inch binder/sublayer and 1 1/2 inch finishing/surface layer of asphalt with options also built in assuming that either 30% or 50% of the subsoil would need to be "undercut" or upgraded, prior to paving).

Ultimately the recommendation of the property team to the Council was that the lowest bidder was also the one whose process they thought to be most effective. The cost of that bid ranges from \$176,355 (30% undercutting) to 197,312 (50% undercutting). The Council approved this for recommendation to the congregation. Two members of the Council with outside experience in this are were encouraged by the bid being that cost-beneficial to UNITY.

The Council's recommendation to the Congregation is to proceed with the resurfacing in the spring of 2022. Their guidance is to assume a cost as high as \$200,000. They further recommend that the congregation liquidate the Edward Jones investment account which has been designated for use on property projects at the CTK campus. This seems a worthy use of those funds. The market value of those investments varies, but most recently was slightly more than \$108,000. Since that value could fall with markets, the Council conservatively estimates its value at \$100,000 and therefore recommends the congregation also do a one-time appeal to its membership to raise an additional \$100,000 to fully fund this project. If we are able to reach that target and the project comes in on the lower end of the cost projection, the Council recommends any excess funds be placed in the congregation's Property Reserve.

Additional Information: Garage and Dumpster Enclosure

People have asked about the new garage that was a part of the Backyard overall plan. It would have been placed on the SW edge of the existing parking lot and would have been 50% larger than the existing garage, primarily to accommodate chairs and tables for the pavilion. A separate garbage enclosure would be constructed on the SE corner of the south lot. The existing garage and garbage enclosure would then be demolished, creating a clear sight-line into the backyard.

The garage/garbage enclosure was eliminated from the current work to contain costs. The current questions wonder if we want to complete it now, lest concrete trucks in the future potentially damage the new parking lot.

This is a tough one to resolve. Two reasons to do the garage now are:

- (1) we have all the necessary permits and approvals; the permits expire by the end of the year.
- (2) doing the work prior to the parking lot would insure we do not damage the lot.

Parking Lot Re-Surfacing Recommondation

Reasons to not do the garage now are:

- (1) It would be an additional cost beyond re-doing the lot which is the most urgent need.
- (2) It's not a given that concrete trucks would damage the lot surface.

It's hard to estimate the cost of the garage given that the original bid was mixed in with all the other work that was being proposed. Cost would also vary based on whether the congregation provided any of the labor. If we simply went off the old bid, the cost would hover around \$62,000 for demolition and construction. That assumed no member labor but also assumed materials costs that have since jumped. The cost assumes a design that meets City of Brookfield requirements, which are higher for a public property like ours compared to a residential garage. (for example a partial brick facade is required so that it reflects the architecture of church building, a metal roof was also approved so that it matches the pavilion).

The Council makes no recommendation on this but wanted the information to be available.



Explanation of Adjustments

Giving's: Based on prior years givings, 2022 has been budgeted for an increase of giving of 5% from 2021 actual. This is in line with the 2020 actual.

Benevolence: Servant Ministries has recommended a 12% giving of revenue to benevolence. Council has recommended an 11.5% of revenue to benevolence

Salaries: HR team has recommended a 4% increase in salaries. This number also includes a part time replacement for video and technology and a part time replacement for administrator and volunteer coordinator. Council has recommended a 2.5% increase in salaries.

Benefits: Different staff at UNITY had different increases in benefits, this ranged from 1% to 5%. Council has recommended to decrease the amount set into Sabbatical reserves by \$5,000 as the current amount in the Sabbatical reserves in enough for 2022 and most, if not all of 2023.

Education, Worship and Music, Communication and Tech: Each of these committees has asked for funds to be used in areas where Council felt we could use funds out of the Memorial Fund instead of the Operating Fund. For Education, these funds are going to new whiteboards in the classrooms and Confirmation Camp scholarships. For Worship and Music, this if for new flip forms, chimes and music licensing. For Communications and Tech, this is for two new computers.

Property: The property team has requested \$96,000 for property this year. Council has recommended to reduce this \$88,000. The \$8,000 difference will come from the property reserve that was set aside from the PPP loan forgiveness. Also coming from the property reserve will be the replacement of a furnace at CTK.
