Minutes of UNITY Lutheran Church Annual Meeting Congregational Meeting February 25, 2024

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held in person at both campuses, with live streaming, and via Zoom. Members present in all locations: 211

Quorum achieved.

Meeting called to order by Council President Colleen King at 9:33 a.m.

Pr. John Horner-Ibler led the opening devotion, observing that it is possible to be in many places and, yet, united in the Spirit and in a common purpose.

Pr. John reflected on how the relationship between Cross of Life (COL) and Christ the King (CTK) began in 2001-'02 when renovations were happening at the COL campus and space was needed for Vacation Bible School (VBS) that summer. He observed that it took courage for COL to ask for the opportunity to use space at CTK. As things turned out, CTK recommended that we jointly host VBS. Pr. John observed that it took generosity of spirit for CTK to extend the invitation and to be accepting and welcoming. Our strength continues to be a spirit of "doing it together" in so many ways.

Phil summarized that the congregation continues to be in very good shape financially, thanks to the generosity of members in their giving. There was some caution about the budget going into December 2023. Members responded in force, resulting in the strongest giving in December in history. We ended 2023 with a surplus of \$34,480. Phil noted that the allocation of expenditures (p. 39 in annual report) is consistent year over year. As detailed in the Fund Balances (p. 37), we have approximately \$517,000 in cash, putting us in a healthy position. In regard to the Backyard Project, Phil pointed out the Summary of the Backyard Project, Jan. 2019 – Feb. 2024, which provides a snapshot of income and expenses. The project is complete.

Phil reminded the Congregation that the COL mortgage is at a 3.65% interest rate and will be paid in full by the end of 2027 – just three years from now.

• Allocation of 2023 Surplus (\$34,480): Phil shared that Council has recommended that 25% of surplus be allocated to Benevolence and that 75% be held in reserve and allocated to anticipated expenses for the Call Process, including travel of candidates and relocation of two pastors.

Phil invited questions on the 2023 budget and surplus. Hearing none, there was a motion to approve the 2023 budget and allocation of 2023 surplus. MSA.

■ 2024 Budget: Phil then presented the proposed 2024 budget, which anticipates a 4% increase in revenue from member giving. He indicated that the budget includes an increase to advance Pr. Sherrie and Pr. Muriel closer to the Synod salary guideline (based on tenure). The budget includes 12.5% for Benevolence, consistent with 2023, and \$5,000 for the Call Process. He also noted that 2024 will be a year of "known unknowns" with the transition of Pr. John and Pr. Muriel and the Call of two pastors. Phil paused for questions.

Question: Does the 2023 surplus get applied to the 2024 expenses? **Answer:** No

Question: How far are pastor salaries from the Synod guidelines? **Answer**: For tenure of 6-14 years, salaries are to be within 96% of guideline. For tenure of 15+ years, salaries are to be within 92% of guideline.

Question: What accounts for the difference between budget and actual for salaries and benefits in 2023? **Answer:** Open Youth Director position and two staff members coming off of the benefits plan.

Question: How do UNITY's reserves compare with Synod recommendations. **Answer**: It is unknown whether there is a Synod recommendation for reserves. UNITY has one month's expenses for church operations in reserve.

Motion to approve the 2024 Budget. MSA Update from the Call Team

Minutes of UNITY Lutheran Church Annual Congregational Meeting February 25, 2024

Melanie Varin introduced Call Team members and provided a brief update on the work of the Team to date. She thanked the Congregation for active participation in the recent input sessions to help shape the profile that will be provided to the Synod. She outlined that three committees have been formed: Congregational Input; Ministry Site Profile (MSP); and Communications. Melanie thanked Ann Hill for her active support of the Call Team, creating a dedicated section of the UNITY website with information relevant to the process.

Call Team members Matt Jolliff and Jessica Schrieber provided an update on the MSP. The Synod provides a form for the congregation to describe itself – including who it is, along with mission and vision. Matt and Jessica also shared three options for a key piece – the summary description (limited to 75 words). The Team shared a draft of the MSP today and invites congregational feedback on both the MSP and the summary description. These will be available through the UNITY website. Once finalized, they will be approved by the team, by Council and then submitted to the Synod so that candidates can initiate next steps.

Melanie also shared that the Call Team will search for an interim pastor to provide supplemental support and bridge the transition. She extended thanks to Pr. John and Pr. Muriel for their years of service, adding that there will be celebrations to come.

Melanie closed by thanking the congregation for its prayers and support. She encouraged outreach to any Call Team member with thoughts and feedback.

- President Colleen King called each meeting to order.
- Motion to open the meeting. Motioned, seconded, passed. (MSP)
- Colleen presented the slate of candidates put forth by the Nominating Committee.
- Colleen invited nominations from the floor three times. Hearing none, she asked for a voice vote. MSP
- Colleen recognized and expressed gratitude for outgoing Council members: Eric Borkenhagen, Youth; Ed Dominski, Communications & Technology; Jackie Herington, Servant Ministries; Colleen King, president; David Koenen, Property; Phil Roemaat, Finance; Susie Sprecher, Adult Programs;
- Motion to close the meeting. MSP

2024 Congregation Voting Meeting to call Pastor Justin Kierzek December 22, 2024

- Phil Roemaat, UNITY Council president, called the meeting to order at 9:40 a.m.
- He welcomed attendees from the Cross of Life campus, Christ the King campus, and those joining via Zoom. He noted the sole purpose of this Special Voting Meeting is for the Congregation to vote on extending a pastoral call.
- Voting members were asked to sign in, and those attending in person received a paper ballot. Names of attendees on Zoom were recorded.

Opening Devotion/Prayer

Pr. Sherrie Lorbeck led a devotion based on a passage from Mark's gospel, chapter 2. She gave thanks for UNITY being led to this milestone day and for the many people who have played a part in the Pastoral Call Process.

New Business

- Phil extended thanks to the Call Committee, which began its work 14 months ago in November 2023; to the Council members, who met Pr. Justin, had dinner with him, and got acquainted with him as a pastoral candidate for UNITY; and to the Greater Milwaukee ELCA Synod team in particular, Bishop Paul Erickson and Pr. Kristin Nielsen, who have assisted UNITY through the Call Process.
- Phil recognized Bishop Paul who was in attendance at the meeting at the CTK campus.
- **Quorum:** Nancy Kostanski confirmed that attendance from the three locations surpassed the quorum (at least 193 voting members) required for the meeting.
- Motion: Phil presented a formal motion on behalf of the UNITY Council to extend a call to Pastor Justin Kierzek. Second by Mark Miller. Unanimously approved.
- Phil reminded the Congregation that a two-thirds majority of voting members present is needed to approve
 the call.
- He invited Melanie Varin, co-leader of the Call Committee, to offer remarks in support of the call. Melanie Varin emphasized that this is a very important decision facing the UNITY Congregation. On behalf of the Call Committee, she cited reasons that impressed the committee that Pr. Justin is a "right fit" for UNITY.
 - O During the interview process, Pr. Justin was always well-prepared. He did his homework about UNITY, listening to 30+ online sermons. He learned the names of the Call Committee in advance and came prepared for every discussion.
 - He has deep professional experience developing programming for young people and youth. He has a
 passion for working with them. Confidentially, he planned an icebreaker activity for UNITY youth
 that was then facilitated by another adult. It was well-received.
 - He enjoys the outdoors, hiking, backpacking, and more which is a good fit for the active UNITY Congregation.
 - He felt a strong call to ministry after years as an educator. He is conversant in the use of technology as part of the changing norms of ministry.
 - Melanie emphasized that it was crucial for the Call Committee that Pr. Justin would work well with Pr. Sherrie. She noted that the two of them met multiple times, getting acquainted personally and professionally.
 - o Pr. Justin also met the UNITY staff, and the staff is supportive of the call.
 - o In conclusion, Melanie shared that the Call Committee unanimously presented the recommendation of the call to Pr. Justin to the UNITY Council.

- Melanie opened the floor for questions. No questions were presented at the COL campus, the CTK campus, or via Zoom.
- Phil then informed the Congregation that the compensation for Pr. Justin would follow the Greater Milwaukee Synod Guidelines for a pastor with seven years experience. Due to the timing, the compensation will be included in the 2025 UNITY budget that will be voted on at the Annual Meeting in February 2025.
- Phil invited questions from the floor a second time. There were none from any of the three locations.
- Phil invited questions from the floor a third time. There were none from any of the three locations.
- Phil closed the discussion period. He invited voting members to complete the ballot, and ballots were collected for tallying. Votes of attendees on Zoom were recorded.
- Voting result: Yes: 292 votes in favor of the call; No: Zero; Abstain: 3. Motion to extend a call to Pr. Justin is approved.
- Phil noted that the Call Committee will continue its work on a call for the remaining open pastoral position. The Committee may choose to tweak the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) to reflect a call for a pastor who will complement the gifts of Pr. Sherrie and Pr. Justin. The Committee will continue its work with Pr. Kristin Nielsen of the Synod to obtain more candidate names.
- Phil then acknowledged the hard work of the UNITY staff during this time of transition. He noted how tough it is on employees during such a time. He also thanked the Congregation for its patience and commitment to stay together and work together during a demanding transition.
- Phil called for a motion to adjourn. Motion by Mark Miller, second by Jensy Engle to adjourn the meeting. Unanimously approved. The meeting adjourned at 10:03 a.m.

I now add 2024 to the list of years I give thanks to God for at UNITY! A year that was pretty much the SAME as all the other years I've experienced here. We gathered together week in and week out for worship in the much the same way, in person at both campuses and now also "live" at 8:30 a.m. on Sunday mornings with the help of our new livestream equipment and camera.

We continued to keep teaching our kids and our youth about who Jesus is and how his life shapes who we are and how we choose to live. They kept adding life, energy and joy that filled our hearts as we listened to them sing or participate in the Children's messages. More than what I could ever lift up here or in the prayers, ;) because I continue to be amazed by the breadth and depth of it myself. By how many people are involved in our partner ministries. By how many people serve

through all of our teams and in worship, education, caring for our sacred spaces and grounds, and helping to make connections by letting people know where you go to church. Thank you!

The other thing I want to lift up is that all throughout the Scriptures, one of the themes we hear about again and again is the need for leadership succession planning!

Moses began mentoring Joshua to be the one who would lead God's people into the promised land, so that there was continuity between the past and the awareness of what God had done for them along with the ability to listen for God's leading into this new place.

Even Jesus began seeking to prepare the twelve disciples to lead after him from the day he called them into the work of fishing for people. He knew that he wouldn't be with them for too long and didn't want everything he did and preached to come to an abrupt end when he faced the cross. Along the way, he even sent a group of seventy out in pairs of two, to go and proclaim the Good News to every house in every town to help spread the word about Jesus.

From the children who were given front row seating in his lap to hear his teaching to those who experienced first-hand the power he had to bring healing or peace to people's lives, to those who witnessed first-hand how he was different and how he used his power always for the good of others. Jesus was preparing young and old alike to be his disciples, students and followers of his ways, who would eventually become teachers and mentors of this faith themselves.

Unlike the current process for how we elect those to serve as Bishops and unlike the typical length of time that most pastors give congregations notice that they are leaving (4 weeks)! We had already begun preparing at the beginning of this year for this time of such immense transition.

Intentionally being open and communicating it gave people time to absorb the news which then allowed us to have more time to think about how to celebrate not just all the "last" moments together but by being focused on all the "first" things that we share.

By creating an amazingly determined and hardworking Call Team who began working long before the norm of waiting until after a pastor has left, to identify what they each most loved about our congregation, before listening to your answers and questions and then putting all that together to share with potential candidates.

Along the way, Muriel and I had a chance to choose Pastor Eric to come and help us in this time in a way that likely changes daily for him, but I am grateful that he has been able to jump onto this fairly fast paced ministry train of people, activities and one idea after another in the way that we both thought he would.

Plus to bring his genuine self, personality, and his gifts of leadership is a tremendous blessing that may not always be a given from every interim pastor, who may come with a "job to do" or focused on getting to heart of the "issue" that needs to be addressed or who simply may not be interested in getting to know people in thinking that they won't be there very long.

And while I think there's still room for us to forge a new path in the way that we remain connected to those who once served here, I also think God is calling us to bring our experience of the importance of relationship building and the need for visioning succession planning to the larger Church. Having started at UNITY with just eight days left in 2024, you might think it would be difficult to find something to say about the year that was. Maybe that would be true for many churches, but not here at UNITY. As I reflect on those first days and now my first month serving on the pastoral team at UNITY, I find myself struck by the kindness, the warmth, and the invitations to meet and learn about everything going on in and around UNITY.

While I was preparing for interviews as part of the call process, I found myself digging through every menu and link on UNITY's website. Everywhere I looked, I found pictures of smiling faces from young to young at heart. I saw descriptions of small projects and huge programs within the walls of the Christ

the King and Cross of Life campuses. I saw all the work happening within our community and extending around the globe. I viewed videos of worship with Pastor Sherrie's heartfelt and deeply meaningful prayers; vignettes with Pastor Muriel dressed in costume as she shared the Good News; and reflections from Pastor John while camping with the confirmation students on the East Coast Road Trip. In all of it, what I saw was a deeply spiritual community who not only speaks the Good News in worship, but lives it and shares it authentically and meaningfully.

At UNITY, 2024 was certainly a year of transition. Pastor John and Pastor Muriel have left tremendously large and indescribably impossible shoes to fill. With that being said, transitions are a part of life and faith. Scripture reminds us of the many times God's people faced seasons of change. From Abraham's call to leave his homeland, to Moses leading the Israelites through the wilderness, to the early church navigating life after Christ's resurrection, we see that God is always faithful, guiding and providing every step of the way. FINANCE

Tim Herman, Finance Chair & Adrienne Krueger, Treasurer



We are thrilled to share that 2024 ended the year with a surplus! This result is amazing in light of the pastoral transitions in 2024. While other congregations have experienced a 10 - 25% decrease in attendance and giving when a pastor leaves, UNITY's giving for 2024 was slightly higher than in 2023. During this transition process, the staff has worked incredibly hard to keep things running smoothly and continue to provide a great place to worship. We thank the staff for their hard work and you for your continued support of UNITY's staff, programs, and ministries.

In December, Pastor Justin Kierzek accepted the call for UNITY. The call team continues the search for another

pastor in 2025, and UNITY continues to look for a director of communications and a youth director. While the searches continue to fill these important positions, UNITY is in a great place financially. The rest of this report provides an overview of the 2024 results and the budget for 2025.

2024 Results

For 2024, UNITY went into the year with a small budgeted surplus with giving of \$1,256,539 and expenses of 1,256,517. Actual giving was \$1,210,700, and expenses were \$1,207,232, which resulted in a small surplus of \$3,468. Actual giving in 2024 was slightly higher than in 2023. This result is an incredible achievement with the pastoral transitions in 2024. Most expenses were similar to 2023; the largest area of savings relative to budget was benefits for staff. Once again, the Congregation made it a huge December with \$240,684 of giving.

Church Council recommends using the \$3,468 surplus from 2024 plus releasing \$15,000 of the \$30,000 reserve for 2024 pastoral moving expenses that were not required when we called Pastor Justin. Church Council recommends using the \$18,468 to share 10% (\$1,847) with our partners via benevolence and the remaining \$16,622 be used for staff bonuses. This will leave \$15,000 in reserve to help manage for unknowable expenses, such as pastoral moving costs.

The church's balance sheet remains strong. Total operating cash is \$352,139. The operating reserve is the church's safety net and contains about one month of operating expenses. UNITY used the remaining Employee Retention Credit (ERC) funds in 2024. Lastly, while not on the balance sheet, the balance of the COL mortgage is \$171,290 as of December 31, 2024, with an interest rate of 3.66%, and maturity date of November 9, 2027.

2025 Budget

Church Council's proposed budget includes a small surplus with budgeted giving of \$1,247,021 and expenses of 1,246,959. For 2025, the budget includes a 3% increase in giving compared to 2024. There was a 40% response rate to the stewardship appeal with an average increase of 6% in the amount pledged for 2025. The budgeted 3% increase in giving takes into account the results of the stewardship appeal and assumes no changes to giving from those who did not respond. The budgeted expenses for 2025 include adjustments to staff pay to bring them to where we think they should be. With the ongoing pastoral call process and the open staff positions, there is a bit of estimation for salaries and benefits. The Finance team will continue to be vigilant and approach 2025 with a flexible mindset. Taking all this into account, we are projecting a break-even year for the church in 2025.

Reflections of Ministry Team Chairs

About the Finance Team

The Finance Team works closely with the UNITY Church Council to plan, monitor, and account for the financial affairs of the church. We develop the budget in consultation with the other UNITY teams, oversee accounting for and depositing of the offerings each week, conduct a limited financial review of prior years' record keeping, and advise the Council on other financial matters as needed.

The Finance Team holds regular meetings with team members monitoring all areas including legal, banking, real estate, and insurance. The current members of the team are Penny Berglund, Michelle Duerr, Kevin Grabowski, Greg Schreiber, and our pastors. We thank them for their support and continuing to help UNITY with their own unique talents, knowledge, and experience. We are a nerdy, yet fun, group who really care about placing the church in the best possible position for both the church's short-term and long-term goals. If any member of the congregation has an interest in joining UNITY's Finance Team, please reach out.

We give special thanks to Matt Griepentrog and Craig Nelson, for all that they do to keep our accounts in order and reconciled. Tracking the finances of a church with an annual budget of more than \$1,200,000 is a ton of record keeping.

Last, thanks to all of YOU as a congregation for your generous giving and commitment to UNITY's mission.

It's pretty impressive that given the church's busy schedule each week and her schedule that she can find time to make sure things are clean and set up before the next thing happening, but she does. Having grown up here, it's clear to see that she takes care of our spaces like they are her own, but she is going to be heading off to college pretty soon, which means we're going to need to find someone to fill her shoes. If you or anyone you know of would be interested in cleaning and doing light set-up 10-15 hours a week, please talk to me or one of the pastors.

We have a long list of property needs and wants that we have been slowly taking care of through the existing budget and designated property funds in order to keep overall expenses down.

Our fire protection company and the City of Brookfield fire inspector were able to meet on site at the COL campus to discuss the situation with our sprinkler heads. We have to replace all the wall mounted ones which is required when one fails a sample testing. In addition, we have to re-test a sample of four of the drop down heads. If one fails, then we will need to work on replacing all of the these throughout the building. If by chance, they pass, we won't need to have them tested for another ten years, at which point, they'd likely need to be replaced. Depending on their location, the biggest challenge is getting access behind the sprinkler head, having to cut through the drywall in the ceiling. This would then need to be replaced in areas that are not easy to get at which means we'd contract someone to do it. (We did utilize Ryan King, one of our college students along with some help from Jan Constable and Denny to patch the holes that were made when they replaced the wall mounted ones which were a little easier to tackle.)

We also would like to replace carpeting and paint the offices at the COL campus that are long past their prime and so that Pastor Justin can officially have a nice, "new" office of his own.

We have one bid and are waiting to hear back from others and we have a team of UNITY volunteers ready to start painting. However, we could use a few strong hands to help disassemble office furniture and move them out and back in. Let me know if you'd be able to help in any way.

While we are asking for quotes for everything, we'll likely not be able to do it all including the Fellowship Hall, Kitchen and classrooms, so we'll tackle as much as we can within our existing means for the year.

In addition, at the CTK campus, we'd like to get back to our plans to update the kitchen and start thinking of ways to open up the kitchen/library, so that we can better use our beautiful patio and enjoy the backyard. Again, let me know, if this would be a project you'd enjoy being a part of helping to think through, get bids for and be a part of helping to shape.

Thank you for all the ways you support UNITY and make it a welcoming place for members, partners and visitors alike!

SERVANT MINISTRIES

After serving as the advocate for the Food Pantry with my husband for several years, taking on the role of Servanthood Ministry Chair in August of 2024, seemed like a good way to continue my support of UNITY's mission to serve our many partners.

UNITY has ten Servanthood Ministry partners which include two inner city of Milwaukee congregations, two addiction treatment centers, a homeless shelter, a free health clinic, a food pantry, and a blood center! Each partner has a dedicated UNITY advocate that works with the partner to create meaningful relationships with our congregation. Thank you to our devoted ministry advocates for your dedication to this important ministry.



In 2024, 12.5% of UNITY's giving (\$150,865) was gifted in benevolence to our partners. The Servanthood Ministry Advocates work with the many partners to project and finalize financial support amounts to assist with our partners' operational needs in order for them to continue with the amazing work they offer. Please refer to the 2024 Benevolence Financial Report for giving details. Also, see below for some of the highlights of the needs that were met for our ministry partners through UNITY's generosity and support.

- Aspen Recovery Center: UNITY donations helped to fund scholarships to clients to support recovery treatment this year. In addition to financial support, we partnered with clients to make fleece blankets, tile coasters, gratitude journals, and install raised garden beds in Aspen's backyard. UNITY members and Aspen clients also enjoyed a pizza dinner, a cookie decorating activity, and a doggy playdate together. UNITY volunteers made a Thanksgiving dinner in November and gave 47 Angel Tree gifts to clients and staff in December.
- <u>American Red Cross:</u> UNITY hosted four blood drives and collected 107 units of blood in 2024 thanks to 123 registered donors. Up to three people can benefit from one unit of blood, so the impact is great with up to 321 people benefitting from this donated blood!
- Bread of Healing Clinic: Thanks to UNITY members for many months of volunteering at medical/dental clinics for un-or-under-insured patients. A big thank you also to ten confirmation students and parent volunteers who helped with the pill sorting this fall. And a special note of appreciation to a UNITY member who stepped up to serve as treasurer for the clinic. Benevolence funds to support the clinic and eight Angel Tree gift cards were given this year.
- <u>Cross Lutheran:</u> UNITY members participated in the Garden Work Party and our Fellowship Choir sang at Cross Lutheran during a service this spring. In addition to financial support, UNITY donations also help to support the food pantry at Cross.
- **El Salvador:** In February, 24 travelers served at the Mission of Healing Clinic providing in-person medical information and aid to 465 patients. In July, 19 UNITY members celebrated with our Salvadoran partners at Cordero de Dios and Rutilio Grande through worship, games, pupusa-making, and dance parties. Pastors John and Muriel were honored for their dedicated commitment and support to our partners at Cordero de Dios and Rutilio Grande. UNITY continues to support scholarships that provide funds for transportation and tuition for students in grade six through high school.

- Hephatha Lutheran Church: UNITY members donated 66 backpacks filled with supplies for students for the start of a new school year. UNITY also purchased diapers throughout the year for the Strong Baby Sanctuary as well as providing lunches served on Saturdays at the Strong Baby Sanctuary. In August, members from Hephatha attended a backyard church service and picnic dinner at CTK. The new van UNITY helped Hephatha purchase was blessed. In October, confirmation students attended a church service at Hephatha and helped serve a lunch. Gloria Dei Bell Choir performed there this fall. 72 Christmas wishes were granted by the UNITY Angel Tree gift donations and many warm winter mittens, hats, socks and scarves too!
- <u>Hebron House:</u> UNITY collected and delivered 30 kitchen kits in support of their housing program to assist young adults, provided hundreds of cookies for two different events, cleaned and organized storage areas and, this past summer a group of confirmation students helped with a painting project. UNITY volunteers also helped at Hebron's fundraising gala in November and delivered 17 Angel Tree gifts in December.
- <u>Serenity Inns:</u> UNITY members, including many confirmation students, continue to provide meals multiple times each month. This year Serenity was able to open up a new residential treatment center to serve an additional 50-60 men in their recovery. In December, 44 gifts were fulfilled by Angel Tree gift donations.
- Waukesha Food Pantry: Thanks to generous financial and food donations, and the many UNITY members who volunteer each month, UNITY continues to support the Food Pantry Serving Waukesha County. The summer and fall bag sales raised \$2449 and \$3411 respectively. This spring the Sunday school students collected hundreds of boxes of cereal and this fall the senior high youth group's scavenger hunt gathered 900 pounds of food! UNITY hosted and helped to sponsor the Food Pantry fundraiser on May 18 and they were able to raise \$40,000 at the event. A recent renovation to improve client services at the Food Pantry, was completed in November thanks in part to a \$14,000 donation from UNITY.
- <u>Lutheran World Relief:</u> The Thanksgiving collection of \$3,824 was donated to support areas that were directly affected by hurricanes Milton and Helene.

The Stewardship Team is a strong, diverse team that represents both campuses and different stages of life. The team's work has been a place to showcase the strengths of each team member. Together we have creativity, organization, a drive to accomplish our tasks, and some tech savvy. We all bring a passion to highlight the good works of UNITY and encourage members to use the gifts God has provided us to support UNITY.

God's gifts of time, talent and financial resources were the focus of the Stewardship Team in 2024. As part of promoting members' involvement and connection to the

church, the Team used educational efforts to help explain how our requests fit into UNITY's current and future needs.

In the Spring of 2024, we did a time and talent drive that explained how many volunteers are needed each weekend (72) and how many ways there are to connect through service, bible studies and small groups (over 120). The drive resulted in some laughs during the T&T video (who wouldn't want a church usher tattoo?) and in a modest increase in members submitting a time and talent form. The team's experience with the drive is that the form may be too formal or daunting. In 2025, we hope to retool the form and seek ways for personal invitations to connect someone with a service or small group opportunity.

In November and December of 2024, we held the annual pledge drive. All of the Stewardship Team members had participated in the 2023 drive, so we had some experience that made it easier to pull together the 2024 pledge drive plan and materials. We selected "Celebrate the Past and Commit to the Future" as our theme to reflect on the many blessings and sweet memories the congregation had in 2024 and to highlight how UNITY remains strong and vibrant as we head into 2025. The core church membership gave a stellular response, with timely pledges and the majority of the submitted pledges committing to roughly the suggested 6% increase. Overall, the drive had a lower response rate than last year's drive. We had 263 commitments for 2025 compared to 298 commitments for 2024. Perhaps the lower response rate was due to all the church activities occurring during the drive or that asking members to share reflections from 2024 and hopes for 2025 took away from the financial part of the drive.

Whether it's an unexpected hospitalization, a recent diagnosis, the death of a loved one, the loss of a job, addiction, anxiety, depression, or virtually anything else, the pastors are only a call, text, or email away. Please never hesitate to reach out - - whether we're the only stop you'll make or just the first step in a longer care process.

The need for "Member Care" has certainly increased over the years here at UNITY. A few years ago when I was called to Christ the King, we were considered the old church with lots

of home-bound and hospitalized, along with a good number of funerals. Cross of Life was younger, so when it happened, those life events seemed more tragic.

Don't get me wrong, UNITY still has a lot of younger people, but guess what? We are all getting older each day and the need for member care continues to increase. 

Giving and Spending Chart Year Ended December 31, 2024



Where is the Surplus going?

In conjunction with the \$3,468 surplus, we will also be reallocating \$15,000 of the 2023 surplus that was originally on hold for the call process. This will be giving us \$18,468 for this year's surplus distribution. Unity has always felt very strong about helping our community and has always made benevolence one of our top focuses. We will be giving 10% of the surplus to benevolence. To the Congregation, the Pastors and staff are a huge part of what makes Unity. The staff has been instrumental in assisting us through this transition. The remaining will be distributed to key staff members as bonuses.

This budget includes:

- 3% projected increase in giving.
- 12% of operating budget allocated to benevolence, while this is a .5% decrease it keeps the actual dollars close to a flat amount. This also does not include directed gifts.
- Increase in salaries includes increasing specific staff's hours, increasing specific staff's pay to be more inline with equivalent market and 2% increase for remaining staff.
- This also budgets \$50,000 for available positions.
- Benefits include yearly changes as well as budgeting for benefits of new staff.
- The increase for property is to help cover some of the upcoming projected projects.
